LAFAYETTE FLYING CORPS ASSOCIATION**Records: 1927-1960****Linear ft.: 10****Approx. no. pgs.: 10,000****HISTORICAL NARRATIVE**

On 20 Apr 1916, after more than a year of political consideration by French authorities, a squadron of American volunteer pilots was ordered to Luxeuil-les-Bains to serve in the French Aviation against the German air forces. The brainchild of only a handful of men, the Escadrille American, as the squadron was first called, was initially composed of twelve American pilots, most of whom were trained in French aviation schools. They were commanded by a French officer, Captain Georges Thenault, and were under the authority of the French Aviation. In Nov 1916, after some pressure from Germany's embassy in Washington, D.C., the squadron was renamed the Escadrille des Volontaires, and finally the Lafayette Escadrille in honor of the great French General who had come to America's aid, a service now being repaid by these pilots. This name was final and has remained in the records of World War I as the famous group of American volunteers who fought, and in many cases died, for France's cause.

Americans continued to volunteer for service in the French Aviation and, as a result, the confusing counterpart of the Escadrille was born. Since the Lafayette Escadrille was only one squadron, Escadrille N 124, capable of equipping ten to fifteen pilots at most, American volunteers were thereafter assigned singly or in pairs to other French squadrons. The organization which processed these men into the French squadrons was known as the Franco-Americaine Flying Corps and finally, as with the Escadrille, the Lafayette Flying Corps. The confusion arises from the fact that both were called "Lafayette," and both were organizations of American volunteers serving in the French Aviation. The real similarities end there. The Lafayette Escadrille was, as previously mentioned, only one squadron which, by America's physical entrance into the war was in early 1918, had numbered a total of forty-three American pilots as members. The Lafayette Flying Corps, on the other hand, had, by the same time, processed one hundred forty-three Americans into numerous French squadrons.

Although America declared war against the Triple Entente on 6 Apr 1917, it was not until Feb 1918, that many of the Escadrille and Flying Corps pilots received their commissions in the U.S. air service. All had been offered the choice of remaining with the allied French squadrons or transferring their allegiance and services to America. The Escadrille decided as an entire squadron to transfer allegiance and as a result became America's first and, for many months, only squadron in France, the 103rd Pursuit Squadron. Many of the Flying Corps pilots, as they had come to be known, although serving in the French Squadrons, also transferred allegiance and served honorably with America until war's end in 1918.

When the war did conclude in late 1918, the comradeship survived. The pilots kept in contact and by 1928 at the prompting of Austen B. Crehore, a Lafayette Flying Corps pilot in Squadron 94, an organization of former members of both Escadrille and Flying Corps pilots was formed. The organizational meeting for L'Escadrille Lafayette Flying Corps Association was held, 9 Apr 1928, and the Association, as an official and representative voice of the pilots, was to last through the early 1960s.

Austen B. Crehore was the prominent organizational figure behind this post-war organization. Throughout the Association's existence, he handled the financial and organizational matters. In most cases, it was Crehore who gathered information on the surviving pilots and he carried on a majority of the correspondence. He may be rightfully identified as the driving force behind L'Escadrille Lafayette Flying Corps Association.

The Association's first and major project was the dedication of the Lafayette Memorial in St. Cloud, France, on 4 July 1928, and involved the contacting and coordination of former pilots, by then scattered around the world, for the pilgrimage to France.

The Memorial was subsequently entrusted to the Foundation du Memorial de Escadrille Lafayette, daughter organization of the Association, and, as such, has retained responsibility for the movement since.

The dedication being successfully completed, the Association kept addresses and up-to-date information on the pilots throughout the next 30 odd years. Reunion and dinners were a major function of the organization and many were held. The Association was also involved in Congressional issues concerning the status of the pilots in relation to benefits received personally and by their survivors, and unsuccessful efforts to secure a posthumous Medal of Honor for Raoul Lufbery.

The Association's last major effort was made over the continuing state of disrepair of the Memorial by the 1950s. Involved in a lengthy debate over whether to transfer the responsibility of the shrine from the Foundation du Memorial de Escadrille Lafayette to the American Battle Monuments Commission the Association decided in favor of keeping the Memorial and the concurrent responsibilities. As of Apr 1978, the Association listed thirteen active alumni.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This collection relates to the organization, activities, and members of L'Escadrille Lafayette Flying Corps Association. In an effort to continue friendships and create a contemporary, representative voice for the American volunteer pilots of the First World War, the Association was formalized and active for many years. The most significant part of the material deals with correspondence between Austen B. Crehore, a driving force behind the organization, and his former comrades; the French Memorial to the Escadrille and Flying Corps; meetings, dinners, and reunions for the flyers; and topical files containing news clippings concerning many members. The balance contains materials which relates to the workings of the organization associated veteran's groups, and various news clippings, magazine articles, and photographs of the men and their activities during and especially after the First World War.

This collection consists of four file drawers of manuscript materials, arranged in thirteen series: Series 1) General Correspondence 1920-1922, 1927-1935, 1937-1939, 1942-1944, 1949-1950, 1956, 1957, 1958-1960; Series 2) Topical Files; Series 3) Organization; Series 4) Membership; Series 5) Meetings; Series 6) Reunions; Series 7) Memorial; Series 8) Battle Monuments Commission; Series 9) Foundation du Memorial de Escadrille Lafayette; Series 10) Affiliated Organization; Series 11) Miscellaneous; Series 12) Printed Matter; Series 13) Photographs.

SERIES ONE: GENERAL CORRESPONDENCE, 1920-1922, 1927-1935, 1937-1939, 1942-1944, 1949-1950, 1956, 1957, 1958-1960, consists of eleven folders of general letter and telegraph type records which contain newsletters to members and replies, questionnaires and responses, inquiries from newspapers, magazines, and individuals, updates from members and relatives, and organizational business matters. Included are letters from Gen. Carl Spaatz and President DeGaulle.

SERIES TWO: TOPICAL FILES, consists of one hundred and twenty-eight folders concerning one hundred and nineteen members of the Escadrille and Flying Corps, and ten associated persons. Included is correspondence, news clippings, and miscellaneous data associated with the post-war activities and lives of the pilots. Files do not contain any World War I combat recollections. Members of note include Herman Chatkoff whose injuries prompted a congressional issue in care of veterans, and Raoul Lufbery, whose gallantry prompted a congressional investigation over a Medal of Honor for those fighting for a foreign nation.

SERIES THREE: ORGANIZATION, consists of nine folders containing the Association's constitution and by-laws and related correspondence; treasurer's reports from 1927 to 1934; bank statements and cancelled checks from the Bank of Manhattan Trust Company from 1932 to 1935, and the American Exchange Irving Trust Company from 1928 to 1932 with associated correspondence. Also included are bills and receipts from various agencies, records and correspondence concerning dues from 1928 to 1931, and a hardbound copy of records, notices, and meetings entitled L'Escadrille Lafayette Flying Corps Association.

SERIES FOUR: MEMBERSHIP, consists of nine folders containing blank and completed applications for membership in the Association and related correspondence; addresses of pilots and relatives including published lists from 1 Feb 1928 and Dec 1957, and assorted lists, 1928-1958. Related correspondence on changes of addresses is included along with a detailed collection of rosters covering enlistment, biographical data, and war records of Lafayette Escadrille and Flying Corps members, Foreign Legion membership, and lists of deaths and surviving members from 1928 to 1958. Also included are rosters, compiled by Cross and Cockade Magazine of the Lafayette Escadrille, Flying Corps, and American squadrons involved in World War I.

SERIES FIVE: MEETINGS, consists of twenty-one folders containing minutes, correspondence, and printed matter on meetings of the Association, beginning with those held by the Temporary Committee in Feb 1928, through the Organizational Meeting, Apr 1928, and afterward through 1956.

SERIES SIX: REUNIONS, consists of twenty-nine folders of dinners, reunions (perhaps the most popular purpose of the organization) and their associated correspondence, printed matter, and miscellany. The first major reunion was held 11 Nov 1927. Significant reunions included a "farewell dinner" held 11 Mar 1949, at the Lafayette Hotel which had hosted many meetings of the Association in New York and was closing in mid-1949; the viewing of the film "Outpost in Morocco," and dinner at the French Embassy, 21 Mar 1949; and the Association's last great reunion, 10 Dec 1957. The series includes a record of expenses, correspondence, agenda, news clippings, and printed matter. The final dinner was held 28 Nov 1966.

SERIES SEVEN: MEMORIAL, consists of six folders which include a great deal of related correspondence, 1927-1929; correspondence and information concerning the moving of some of the pilots' remains; correspondence and organizational records concerning the disagreement over whose names should be printed on the memorial; and information from assorted travel agencies concerning the trip. Also included is information and correspondence related to Congressional Bill H.R. 5494 concerning the transference of those Lafayette pilots who died before America's entrance into the war into the U.S. service so that their relatives might receive compensation from the U.S. Government to visit the graves of the deceased pilots.

The memorial, a huge stone crypt and surrounding gardens and fountains, located at St. Cloud, France, was probably the greatest single project on which the Association was involved, and the trip to Europe in 1928 by many of the pilots who flew for France before U.S. entrance into the war are honored on this memorial. Much of the correspondence concerning it and those who would be buried in it involves Lewis D. Crenshaw, who handled the project in France.

SERIES EIGHT: BATTLE MONUMENTS COMMISSION, consists of five folders, all correspondence, dealing with the transferal of the Lafayette Memorial in France to the care of the American Battle Monuments Commission. General correspondence, 1947-1954 and 1956-1959, includes letters from pilots who are concerned over the disrepair into which the Memorial had fallen, consideration of transferal to the Commission, and finally, the decision to keep control of the Memorial but to allow for inspection and recommendations by the Commission. Topical correspondence on the matter includes correspondence with Carl Dolan and Harold B. Willis.

SERIES NINE: FOUNDATION DU MEMOIRAL DE ESCADRILLE LAFAYETTE, consists of five folders and relates to the Battle Monuments issue. The Foundation, formed by the American based L'Escadrille Lafayette Flying Corps Association, was directly responsible for maintenance and control of the Memorial in France. Included in this series are minutes and correspondence of meetings, 1951-1960, and also Treasurer's Reports, 1949-1959.

SERIES TEN: AFFILIATED ORGANIZATIONS, consists of seven folders containing correspondence, records, and printed matter concerning these organizations. Included are the American Order Croix de Guerre, an organization for those decorated with France's Croix de Guerre, many of whom were Lafayette pilots; International League of Aviators, which was just that; The Lafayette Fellowship Foundation and The Order of Lafayette, Inc., both associations concerning former Lafayette pilots; Les Amis de La Legion Etrangere Society and Veterans of

the French Foreign Legion, also containing many Lafayette pilots. Also included are assorted news clippings of some of these groups.

SERIES ELEVEN: MISCELLANEOUS, consists of eight folders assorted correspondence, receipts, clippings, and articles pertaining to the Association's use of an addressograph; the book by Nordhoff and Hall, The Lafayette Flying Corps; the decision on a letterhead for the Association's stationery; the organization's listing for postal services; and Luce's Press Clipping service. Also covered are William Wellman's film, Lafayette Escadrille; and another, more popular work by Nordhoff and Hall, Mutiny on the Bounty; and the Lafayette Flag. Publication: The Lafayette Flying Corps in Special Collections: D570.7, 103d, H17.

SERIES TWELVE: PRINTED MATTER, consists of publications, articles, and a vast assortment of news clippings concerning the Escadrille and Flying Corps and their members. The forty-six folders include Congressional Record, 7st Congress, 1st Session, concerning Marshal Foch; Sky Fighters of France, which includes paintings of Battles in the Air; Airpower Historian, "The Lafayette Escadrille" and "A Fateful Tuesday, 1918" concerning James Norman Hall; Air Force Magazine, "The Air Service in the Great War;" The Ambassador, coverage of the Memorial dedication; Ebony, "The Incredible Life of Monsieur Bullard;" Friends, "This Private Air Force has a Bygone Air;" Hangar Flying, "Lafayette Escadrille Explained;" Interceptor, "A Fighter Pilot," concerning Reginald Sinclair; Liberty, "No Parachutes," series, 25 Feb 1933-1 Apr 1933; Revue Historique, "La Fayette Squadron;" New York Herald Tribune, "A Winged Knight;" Think, "The Lafayette Escadrille" and Time, "Heroes." Also included are a voluminous amount of press clippings concerning deceased pilots, imposters, the Memorial, and relatives of the pilots. Some special attention is given to the American volunteers serving in the Second World War in the Royal Air Force's Eagle Squadron; a revised Lafayette Escadrille spirit in France; those Lafayette pilots of the First World War who then served in the second; and their relatives.

Also included in printed matter are a market book for the Association, admission cards to the Memorial, cardograph plates, and a scrapbook on members of the Escadrille and Flying Corps.

SERIES THIRTEEN: PHOTOGRAPHS, consists of fifteen folders containing unframed, mostly uncaptioned photographs of the Memorial under construction, being dedicated, and after completion. Included are six packets of photos of the dedication ceremonies which contain views of the area, members and their relatives at the Memorial and afterwards, speeches being made, and the attending crowd. Correspondence concerning orders and payment for the packets is included as are small tourist booklets containing more photos of the Memorial. Other unframed, uncaptioned photos concern Liberty magazine and the correspondence relating to the identification of the pilots pictured; an unidentified pilot and aircraft; and another identified pilot, crew, and craft. Unframed, captioned photos include the 11 Mar 1949 reunion; four copies of the 27 Jun 1950 reunion; Dumares G. Spencer; the four original members of the Escadrille and Captain Thenault; and U.S. Air Force photos of De Havilland 4-B's, Salmson 2 A.2, Spad 13 (with Rickenbacker), Newport 27 and Handley-Page. Also included are photos of a Lafayette emblem and plaque and a negative of a French plaque in a stadium.
