SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This manuscript record consists of six boxes and one oversize package of material, further arranged into the cartons in which the material was received. Within the cartons the items are consecutively numbered.

ARRANGEMENT AND DESCRIPTION

CARTON ONE

Item 1 "About this green photo album," (1945), relates to Soderberg staying with British internees in Spittal in southern Austria at the very end of the war, Apr-May 1945. When Soderberg stayed with the men in Camp Ilag XVIII, Spittal, he "could use his camera openly," the result was the attached series of photos which correspond to the manuscript, "The Sane Asylum," (located in Carton One, Item 2.)

"About this manuscript," <u>The Sane Asylum</u>," by Alfred J. Bruck, a Jew, is a diary kept during the war at Ilag XVIII at Kreuzburg located in Upper Silesia. The prisoners were all civilians captured by the Germans at the outbreak of war. Soderberg visited this camp quite often and spent New Year's Eve 1944-1945 here. The photographs in green scrapbook, Item 1, correspond to the manuscript. The manuscript is divided into thirty-five chapters.

Item 1 Index cards (four separate stacks) with notes, in Swedish, from interviews with individual POWs as a part of the function of the YMCA delegates.

(NOTE: Second shipment of material from Soderberg provided a booklet with English translation of each one of the cards; translations are now filed with index cards).

Item 2 Selected newspaper articles, written by Soderberg, mainly in Swedish papers and magazines, picturing life in POW camps and in various activities.

Item 1 Book, wooden, gift to Soderberg from a German captain from Belgium, 1945. A collection of handwritten (printed) pages containing Goethe's most famous poem. It was made in an educational camp. (NOTE: that on 16 Nov 1985, Soderberg has written in front of the book: "This is of the most precious souvenirs from a German POW camp. I am happy that it can be kept at the USAF Academy for all time to come.")

Item 2 Book, green, two page welcome from a German POW Camp, a 'thank-you' to YMCA.

Item 3 Eleven linoleum prints by Uri Koch/Ilag XVIII, Spittal, Austria, allegorically depicting the mind and thoughts of a Jewish internee dreaming about the

future state of Israel, 8 May 1945; prints wrapped in green construction paper.

Item 4 Five pages bound in metal on bottom, reads "Programm Fuer Osterveranstaltunger" Camp 2232. In German, about a Sportfest and presented especially to Soderberg. Last page depicts a forlorn German soldier standing alone by his camp in the woods.

Item 5 Twenty-two folders.

Camp magazine covers at Christmas time in Germany from American, British, Belgium, and French camps, 1943-1944.

POW arts in camps in Germany, including drawings, wood carvings, and linoleum prints.

Item 6 Book, green with white emblems, "Das Schwarze Brett," translated: The Blackboard. (YMCA, 1947). This book distributed by the YMCA workers in Belgium in 1947 when the last German POWs were repatriated. Book

includes literary and artistic products by German POWs.

Item 7 Christmas greetings from a German POW Camp in Belgium to the YMCA, 1945. The greetings are enclosed with heavy green linoleum covers, a leather spine, with a Christmas etching on front.

Item 8 Book, <u>For This Alone</u>, by R.P.L. Mogg, aka John Dominy, (a journalist, Stalag Luft 6) contains poetry, 1943. Included is the introduction about the author - "altogether this book represents many hours of enjoyable work executed to while away what might have been dull moments in a Prisoner-of-War Camp." Item 1

Green notebook, "World's Alliance of YMCA's War Prisoners' Aid" containing some of the history of the War Prisoners' Aid in Belgium, 1946. Soderberg writes about the first months of 1945 when several thousands of Germans were taken prisoner in northwestern Germany, Holland, and Belgium and sent to camps in Belgium and about the need for welfare work among the POWs. This notebook covers different aspects of the work in these camps. Included is a section: Permanent POW Camps in Belgium, which the YMCA served. Writings also covered billeting, transportation, shipment of books, maps of POW camps. Also included are "Special Problems in the Camps in Belgium," i.e., different levels of intellect, religion, the relations between the British and the Germans. In addition, a section: "Education in POWs Camps in Belgium," with Professor Hans Scherer; and a section: "Aid to the Religious Life in the POW Camp," "Thoughts about the Problems of Play-Acting in POW

Camps;" and finally "Music Life in Our Camp." This notebook contains photographs of the people connected with the camps, including Soderberg.

Item 2

Green-mottled notebook containing reports and documents from the work with the War Prisoners' Aid of the YMCA in Belgium, Aug 1945-Jul 1946. Included are instructions for "Visitors" from the YMCA who were to visit the camps. Every camp visitor had to make his own arrangements and had always to remember that he was representative of thousands of friends and supporters of the Y work. This notebook covers the reports or "surveys" on POW work in Belgium beginning Aug 1945, with Soderberg authoring many of the reports. End of the notebook reports are in German.

Item 1

Contains twelve items of YMCA literature, magazines, and pamphlets representing the countries that supported the YMCA, mainly the USA, Great Britain, Switzerland, and Sweden. The German government contributed with direct gifts of money for the work performed among German POWs in other countries. Included:

<u>Un Message Pour Tons (Predigt fuer protestantische franzosische Kriegsgefangene)</u>, roughly translated as, "A Sermon for French Prostestant POWs."

Two booklets, YMCA; one reads:, <u>L'U.C.J.G.</u>, in French, explaining the Y as an organization whose secretaries visit the camps, whose officers in different countries supply them with books, musical instruments, athletic

and other material. The red triangle on box became familiar to POWs. These booklets present some info about a youth movement.

Two small brochures.

A Christmas Festival.

Zalig Kerstfeest, compiled and dedicated to all POWs through the War Prisoners' Aid of the YMCA.

Book, <u>I Was in Prison</u>, with sign, "by trespassing the warning fence the guard will shoot immediately." This book pays tribute to many organizations without whose help prison life would have been unbearable. This book regarded as the "flagship" of YMCA PR in order to raise money for the POW work.

Magazine, <u>YMCA-Communique</u>, Vol. 1, No. 3, published bimonthly at Geneva, May-Jun 1948.

Item 2 Book, <u>The Yorkshire Post</u>, Kriegie edition (Stalag Luft VI, POW edition). Autographed by Dixie Deans, "To my good friend, Henry Soderberg, whose good work helped to make this book possible." Book contains cartoons, articles about the White Rose Club entertainment, sports summary, the cinema organ and many other subjects. This book was handwritten in camp and sent to England in order to show the people at home what camp life looked like.

Item 3 Booklet, <u>Get a Load of This</u>. A cartoon record of active and inactive service by Cal Younger. (Autographed by Younger, "For Henry Soderberg." Cal Younger was one of 20,000 Australians to go overseas to serve with the RAF, 1939-45. He was a POW for some time and during this, further developed his flair for cartooning and finally this book. Also, Cal Younger is the editor of the ex-POW magazine of the Royal Air Force, "The Kriegie."

Booklet, For One Night Only. A review, presented by the RAF Prisoners of Stalagluft VI and dedicated to the World's Alliance of YMCAs. Letter dated 19 Aug 70 in long-hand to Soderberg from the Secretary of State from Wales thanking him for program. The program lists Soderberg as giving address. The letter from the Secretary of Wales is interesting for in 1944 he was in Stalagluft VI, and the speaker of that show. Soderberg met him by coincidence in Cardiff and sent him a copy of the program. He returned it with copy of above referenced letter. "For One Night Only" show was put on stage because of the YMCA visit, with only one copy of the program made, that for Soderberg.

Item 5 Book, No Flight from the Cage, by Calton Younger, contains an inscription to Soderberg by James Deans, dated 25 Nov 1967; published 1956.

Item 1

This entire package consists of the publication, Ceux Du IA, (Stalag IA, Stablack, North Koenigsburg) Belgium ex-POWS. The Ceux Du IA contains interesting reports from East Prussia, from camp life. Many of the stories told (in French) about the last days of the camp with the Russians advancing are considered absolutely unique and cannot be found anywhere else in literature about WWII. This was one of the first camps inside Germany to be exposed by the advancing Russian armies. 1949 (1-issue) 1967-79 in this carton; 1980-85 continued in Carton Six A, Box Four. Added to Carton 6, Box 3, Item 1, are twelve issues of the Pub "Ceux Du IA" numbers 510-521, Mar 1990-Mar 1991.

Item 1

Bound book: A compilation of selected reports from inside Germany during 1943 and 1944. The YMCA delegates' reports had to be written in the German language and were censored, in fact, it could be noted that those reports always had to be censored by the Germans before they could be distributed to the outside world. The reports therefore became rather standardized and contain many gaps. Nevertheless they tell the story about the needs of the camps in relation to leisure time activities; they also give significant comments here and there about conditions, initiatives, cooperative attitudes from camp commandants, etc. Every camp visit had to be reported to the German authorities, to the YMCA. The Y delegates tried to be objective and write things as they saw them. After New Year's 1945, communications were very bad inside Germany, mail did not function and the situation became chaotic and many reports got lost at that time. Many of the reports were translated into English in the USA, copies were not available.
